Holy Hour for the Sanctification of Priests
May 20 at 7PM

On the third Thursday of every month at 7PM in the lower chapel, we will be offering a Holy Hour for the Sanctification of Priests. This is something recommended by the Congregation of the Clergy and, in this our day and age, sorely needed. This secular age of ours presents some unique challenges to the Church and to Her ministerial priesthood. The current priest shortage adds to the stress that many priests feel and can be a challenge to their spiritual life and pastoral service. Thursday of Holy Week our Lord instituted the Holy Eucharist and priesthood, it is an ideal day to pray for priests before the Blessed Sacrament. The Holy Hour will consist of: adoration; the rosary; litany and prayer of petitions; silent prayer and benediction. "During that month I met with many holy Priests, and yet I saw that even though the sublime dignity of Priesthood raises them higher than the Angels, they are still but weak and imperfect men. If holy Priests, whom Our Lord in the Gospel calls the salt of the earth, have need of our prayers, how much more the struggling and the lukewarm?"

Called to the Culture of Life Pro-Life Initiative at St. John the Evangelist: Stay Informed

Three bills currently before the MA legislature alarm pro-life advocates: (1) "An Act relative to end of life options" (HD1456), (aka the Physician Assisted Suicide Act), (2) "An Act to Require Public Universities to Provide Medication Abortions" (SD1431), and (3) "An Act relative to healthy youth," a school curriculum mandate that imposes secular sex education on public school students K-12. At the end of March 2021, all three bills went to committee, the first step on their way towards a vote on enactment. CROSS ROADS

**Acts 1: 15-17, 20a, 20c-26; Psalm 103: 1-2, 11-12, 19-20;
1 John 4: 11-16; John 17: 11b-19**

The setting in today's gospel is shortly before he and the apostles would go to the garden where Jesus would be arrested. "But now I am coming to you" Jesus prays to the Father in the presence of his apostles. He petitions to the Father that they be one as he and the father are one, and that they be protected from the evil one. Jesus acknowledges that they will be hated just as he is hated because they do not belong to the world any more than he belongs to the world. This was a prayer, but it also was a message to the apostles of what to expect. But that is not all. That prayer and that message was for us as well! In the lines that follow Jesus includes all of us: "I pray not only for them, but also for those who will believe in me through their word, that they all may be one, as you, Father, are in me and I in you, that they also may be in us, that the world may believe that you sent me...that the love with which you loved me may be in them and I in them." Love, intimate relationship to God, sacrifice, and witnessing to the truth in the face of opposition was to be carried out through the ages.

In the Acts of the Apostles, after prayerful consideration, Matthias is selected to replace Judas. Mathias had been a disciple from the beginning and could testify to witnessing the risen Christ. With the help of the Holy Spirit, Apostolic succession had begun as well as the teaching authority of those selected to carry on as witnesses and defenders of the truth. Christ's prayer in today's gospel included us in that mission.

In the First Letter of John, we are reminded that our salvation is a loving gift from God who gave his only Son for that salvation. Following Christ's example, we are in this world, but we are not of it. We remain in God and he in us when we love each other the way he loves us. That is how we carry on witnessing to the Way, the Truth, and the Life. It is how we remain upright in an upside-down, violent world that kills the unborn, attacks the family, and attempts to cancel anyone who believes that there is an objective right and wrong. We are to act, relate, lead, help one another, and obey the Lord with love. I have used adjectives like "trying," "challenging," and "unsettling" to describe our times. Now I must say that these times are, at times, frightening. But be at peace, for the Holy Spirit is with us. St. Teresa of Calcutta said, "Love begins at home, and it is not how much we do...but how much love we put into that action." To quote St. Padre Pio: "Rely on Jesus...do good and leave the good outcome to Jesus."
