

Fr. Henault Visit

Fr. John Henault, visiting from Gonaives, Haiti celebrated 10 AM Mass with us on Sunday, August 2nd. In addition to working with the local Sisters of Charity Hospice, Fr. Henault has been primarily working with people who have Hansen's disease (leprosy) and doing his best to get them treatment. While there is one clinic that can deal with this, it is 300 miles round trip and monthly bus transportation for the many patients is expensive. Father has hired a doctor and nurse to diagnose the local people. When father left Haiti a few weeks ago, he had 47 patients. In recent contact with the medical team, Fr. Henault found out that he now has 71 patients.

Fr. Henault has been working to get a clinic open locally but this has been very difficult. The government does not want to admit that the disease even exists in their country as it is bad for tourism. Upon his return, he has meetings scheduled with the World Health Organization to find out if they can assist him by providing medicine for a local clinic.

During his visit, father expressed his gratitude for all the support that parishioners of St. John's have provided to him, and asked for your continued prayers. The Mission Apostolate group believes that this is a challenging mission for anyone, much less, someone who turns 80 years old this coming December. The funds we send are being used to keep people alive, make them non-contagious and over time, cure them of this disease. Anyone wishing to make a donation over the next week can forward it to St. John's in an envelope marked for Fr. Henault. It can either be dropped in the collection basket or mailed to St. John's Parish Global Mission Apostolate, 20 Church Street, Hopkinton, MA 01748.

20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Unless one would want to live exclusively on milk (cow, sheep, or goat), we humans kill what we eat. We pick living things off of plants and trees: green beans, cobs of corn, apples, peaches. We eat the plants themselves: lettuce, cabbage, herbs like parsley and basil. We even eat the seeds themselves, consuming that which could produce more: almonds, peas, wheat, which is crushed and ground to make bread. Our omnivore appetite does not stop there. We haul fish from the sea; we process poultry by the millions; and we slaughter livestock to nourish us and keep us healthy. But we should recognize that to provide for our well-being, we kill and consume what God has placed here for our use. That may seem like a pretty harsh description of how we live, but it is how we relate to food. What was once living sustains our lives. In this weekend's Gospel Jesus is very direct about what gives us life. He says, "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you." Because Jesus sacrificed himself for our sake upon the cross, we humans can admit that we do indeed kill what we eat. Taking our sins upon himself, Jesus died for us, and as uncomfortable as it may be, we cannot avoid that reality. He died an agonizing death upon the cross, so that we might be freed from the power of sin and death. But he did not stay dead. He rose to life. When we eat his flesh and drink his blood in the Communion that we share, we have life because of him. What looks and tastes like bread and wine is the body and blood of Christ, and we eat and drink to be nourished with his life. In our Communion, we trust in his promise that we will live forever.
