Where we are With Religious Services

- Weddings, Funerals and Baptisms will continue to be offered, within the current Commonwealth emergency guidelines.
- The Church will be opened for all those who would like to make a visit on weekends, from 8AM-7PM. The lower chapel on weekdays from 7AM-7PM, except on Thursdays: 9AM-2PM.
- Sunday mornings the most holy Eucharist will be exposed for adoration from 8AM-12Noon.
- Private Masses are taking place and the scheduled Mass intentions are being said.
- At this time, there are no public Masses; no public confessional times; no public Stations of the Cross. The parish mission has been canceled.
- The rich and powerful devotional practices of the Church, i.e., the holy rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, and the Stations of the Cross are encouraged, most especially a family rosary on Sunday.

Please note that we are all in a state of flux, and all things listed above are contingent on the Commonwealth and Archdiocese protocols.

How to Make a Spiritual Communion

Given our current restrictions, many are trying to watch Mass at home either through EWTN or CatholicTV, and when we do so we are encouraged to make a Spiritual Communion. What is that? A Spiritual Communion is a prayer professing faith in Jesus Christ's real presence in the Holy Eucharist and inviting our Savior to come live in our hearts.

Begin by examining your conscience and making a good Act of Contrition. Then pray one of the prayers recommended by the saints for inviting Christ into your heart. Here is one by St. Alphonsus Liguori:

My Jesus, I believe that You are truly present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there, and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

A Spiritual Communion can never fully take the place of receiving Holy Communion at Mass, but in these extraordinary times, It can help us to stay close to our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

The traditional Act of Contrition:

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended thee, And I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven And the pains of hell, But most of all because they have offended thee, my God, Who art all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve with the help of Thy grace, To confess my sins, to do penance, and to amend my life. Amen.

CROSS ROADS

Ezekiel 37: 12-14; Psalm 130: 1-8; Romans 8: 8-11; John 11: 1-45

There was a time that we would say that a person is as good as his word. If we promised something important, we would emphasize the promise by adding, "I give you my word." In Ezekiel the Lord says, "I will open your graves and have you rise...I will put my Spirit in you that you may live...I have promised and I will do it." In Romans, St. Paul tells us that "If the Spirit of the One who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, the one who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also..." St. Paul is reminding us of the Lord's promise of redemption and resurrection, if only we would believe, dwell in the spirit and not in the flesh. In these days of disease, anxiety and semi-isolation, we may be learning that we can live more simply, that there are some physical things that we can live without; and that there are spiritual things without which we cannot live fully.

The Lord God gave of his own substance to dwell among us in the person of Jesus Christ. In Jesus Christ, the Lord God reveals himself in our midst as the fullness of love, empathy, kindness, redemption and forgiveness. In today's gospel Jesus demonstrates that he is "the resurrection and the life..." who cares about and cries with us. He promises that "...whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die." Martha expressed how she had come to believe that Jesus was the Christ, the Son of God. After this, and having wept twice, Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead. Do we believe as Martha believed?

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...and without him nothing came to be...And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." He continues to dwell among us in the flesh through the Eucharist. The Lord God's promise of redemption and resurrection is demonstrated through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, the Word Made Flesh. Do we believe this? We must! Through Jesus Christ, the One Lord God physically entered the world, and sealed His promise!! He gave us His Word!!!
