


DIVINE MERCY NOVENA

Where We Are With Religious Services

- Weddings, Funerals and Baptisms will continue to be offered, within the current Commonwealth emergency guidelines.
- The Church will be opened for all those who would like to make a visit on weekends, from 8AM-7PM. The lower chapel on weekdays from 7AM-7PM, except on Thursdays: 9AM-2PM.
- Sunday mornings the most holy Eucharist will be exposed for adoration from 8AM-12Noon.
- Private Masses are taking place and the scheduled Mass intentions are being said.
- At this time, there are no public Masses; no public confessional times; no public Stations of the Cross. The parish mission has been canceled.
- The rich and powerful devotional practices of the Church, i.e., the holy rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, and the Stations of the Cross are encouraged, most especially a family rosary on Sunday.

Please note that we are all in a state of flux, and all things listed above are contingent on the Commonwealth and Archdiocese protocols.

How to Make a Spiritual Communion

Given our current restrictions, many are trying to watch Mass at home either through EWTN or CatholicTV, and when we do so we are encouraged to make a Spiritual Communion. What is that? A Spiritual Communion is a prayer professing faith in Jesus Christ's real presence in the Holy Eucharist and inviting our Savior to come live in our hearts.

Begin by examining your conscience and making a good Act of Contrition. Then pray one of the prayers recommended by the saints for inviting Christ into your heart. Here is one by St. Alphonsus Liguori:

My Jesus, I believe that You are truly present in the most Blessed Sacrament. I love You above all things and I desire to receive You into my soul. Since I cannot now receive You sacramentally, come at least spiritually into my heart. I embrace You as if You were already there, and unite myself wholly to You. Never permit me to be separated from You. Amen.

A Spiritual Communion can never fully take the place of receiving Holy Communion at Mass, but in these extraordinary times, It can help us to stay close to our Lord in the Most Blessed Sacrament.

The traditional Act of Contrition:

O my God, I am heartily sorry for having offended thee, And I detest all my sins, because I dread the loss of heaven And the pains of hell, But most of all because they have offended thee, my God, Who art all good and deserving of all my love. I firmly resolve with the help of Thy grace, To confess my sins, to do penance, and to amend my life. Amen.

The Veiling of Crosses and Statues

According to the Roman Missal, the practice of covering crosses and images in the church may be observed. beginning on the Saturday before the fifth Sunday of Lent. In 1988, the Sacred Congregation for Divine Worship, in Paschale Solemnitatis, encouraged the practice, though it is not mandatory. This practice was obligatory in the Church for centuries, up until 1970. Why does the Church encourage this practice? To heighten our Lenten awareness and sharpen our spiritual focus on the great mysteries of our faith that Holy Week makes present: the passion, death, and resurrection of our beloved Savior. In the words of the noted Benedictine liturgist Abbot Dom Gueranger. presentiment of that awful hour of our Savior's passion leads the afflicted mother, the Church, to veil the image of her Jesus: the cross is hidden from the eyes of the faithful. The statues of the saints, too, are covered; for it is but just that, if the glory of the Master be eclipsed, the servant should not appear."





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CROSS ROADS By Deacon Tony

Matthew 21:1-11; Isaiah 50:4-7; Psalm 22:8-9,17-20,23-24; Philippians 2:6-11; Matthew 26:14—27:66

Today 's readings illuminate that Jesus truly came to us to fulfill the Scriptures regarding who and what the Messiah would be. Out of overwhelming love, Christ, the Word of God who always was and always will be, poured himself out into the frailty of human existence to sacrifice himself to save humanity. As such, Jesus Christ would open a path to sainthood, a path to eternal life with Him. The quickly changing scenes, events, and behaviors portrayed in today's readings can overload our senses, and logic, so much more for those who lived through it. The adulation of Jesus' triumphant entrance into Jerusalem, and his celebration of the Passover with the Apostles, dramatically changes into Jesus' prediction that he would be betrayed, that the faith of the apostles would be shaken, and that even Peter would deny him. The scene at Gethsemane is peaceful and prayerful at first; but quickly and dramatically changes to Jesus' agony in anticipation of what he must face, his submission to the will of the Father, the betrayal, his arrest, the abandonment by his apostles, Peter's denial, and Peter's bitter distress and sorrow. Finally, we follow Jesus through his humiliation, torture, and death on the cross.

Today's readings also remind us that we too betray and deny Christ by our own sinfulness. Do not despair. Saint Augustine coined a phrase that was made popular by Oscar Wide, "Every saint has a past, and every sinner has a future." If there was hope for the apostles who knew Christ and abandoned him, there is hope for us. The remaining elven apostles, plus Paul all became saints.

Let us prepare ourselves during Holy Week to celebrate the Resurrection. Let us fast, sacrifice and pray. In this time of pandemic, let us remember that social distancing need not lead to social disengagement. Reach out. Call people and remind them that somebody cares. Jesus moved determinedly into the headwinds of resistance to the point of death on a cross, and he would be lifted and exalted. Planes take off by heading into the wind. During Holy Week and thereafter let us move determinedly through the head winds or our own crosses so that, by the grace of God, we too may rise to be the saints that the Lord intends us to be.
