Pro-life Initiative at St. John the Evangelist

No European nation allows elective abortions through all nine months of pregnancy "as is effectively permitted in several U.S. states." The U.S. is one of a small handful of nations, including China and North Korea, that allow lateterm abortions. A recently released Charlotte Lozier Institute study found that 47 out of 50 European nations restrict abortion to prior to 15 weeks. The majority (27) limit elective abortion to 12 weeks. Prompted by a Mississippi law that protects the life of the unborn starting at 15 weeks, the U.S. Supreme Court, in the fall of this year, will consider the constitutionality of limits on abortion prior to viability (24-28 https://lozierinstitute.org/new-studyweeks gestation). mississippis-15-week-limit-on-abortion-in-the-mainstream-ofeuropean-law/. CROSS ROADS

1 Kings 19: 4-8; Psalm 34: 2-9;
Ephesians 4: 30—5:2; John 6: 41-51

I read an article in CRUX magazine regarding a Pew Research Center Poll of July 2019. Of the many facts and figures, there were some that really stand out: half the Catholics in the United States know that the Catholic Church teaches that the Eucharist is the actual Body and Blood of Jesus Christ; most of the other half thought the Church teaches that the Eucharist is just a symbol of Christ's body; only one-third of Catholics believe that the Eucharist is the actual Body and blood of Christ; twenty-two percent of Catholics reject the reality of transubstantiation, even though they know the Church's teaching. Practicing Catholics (defined as Catholics who go to Mass at least once per week) are more likely to believe, but shockingly, even among such "practicing Catholics," only sixty-three percent accept the teaching of transubstantiation. I cannot vouch for the accuracy of the poll; but if is anywhere near close to accurate, it is alarming.

The followers of Jesus and others to whom he preached in today's gospel, found it hard to believe what he was saying. For some, he was just the adult local kid claiming to be the bread of life sent from heaven. Jesus said: "Everyone who listens to my Father and learns from him comes to me. Not that anyone has seen the Father except the one who is from God." Jesus, "...the living bread that came down from heaven..." in effect was claiming to be God. Jesus lost many followers that day, and the disciples were, shall we say, wondering. Our own secular world has brought out some of the same human skepticism and cynicism of Christ's time on earth. That is why we desperately need the Eucharist and its sanctifying grace that helps us to rid ourselves (as Saint Paul points out) of bitterness, fury, and malice; and replace those things with sacrificial love, compassion, and forgiveness. The Eucharist gives us the nourishment we need to rid ourselves of the kind of despondency and fear that Elijah was battling in today's first reading. But the Lord gently nourished and encouraged Elijah to complete his long journey. The Eucharist gently and lovingly gives us nourishment, strength, and courage for our long journey toward eternal joy; and it enables us to be in communion with Christ and with each other.

We believe because we have God's Word for it: "This IS my body... This IS my blood." The Eucharist is not a mere symbol. The Eucharist is not a metaphor. The Eucharist IS a metaphysical reality: the real presence of Jesus Christ in the fullness of his human and divine natures. Therefore, as true believers, we approach the Eucharist with faith, humility, respect, and adoration. We confess to purge ourselves of serious sin before receiving. We spend some quiet time with him whenever we can, even if only for a few minutes before and after Mass. We pray: "Jesus, I trust in you! My Lord and my God, into your hands I commend my spirit."
