<u>Updated COVID Protocols</u> from the Archdiocese of Boston

The Archdiocese of Boston has updated their protocols with regard to COVID safety measures. These measures take effect on the weekend of Labor Day (September 4 and 5).

Regarding Safety Precautions at Masses:

All parishes are mandated to have clearly marked areas of the Church for people who want to wear masks and be sitting only near people who are wearing masks.

Here at St. John's, pews on the north side of the church will be marked with blue tape for parishioners who want to wear masks. Please do not sit in this area without wearing a mask. Thank you for your cooperation in helping to make everyone feel safe and welcome at Mass.

Fr. Henault Haitian Missions

Many of you are familiar with Fr. John Henault, Oblate Missionary of Mary Immaculate who has served in Haiti as a missionary for most of his adult life. Father is currently 85 years old. He usually celebrates a 10AM Sunday Mass here at St. John's in August while he is here for his yearly family, medical and dentist visit.

For the second year in a row, due to Covid as well as the dangerous political situation in Haiti, father was not able to visit his family home in Sutton. Consequently, he was unable to make his usual visits to local parishes for fundraising in support of his "St Damien's Clinic" for Hansen's Disease (Leprosy).

Fortunately, Father's residence in Gonaives received only a widening in the existing cracks due to the recent earthquake and the clinic remains open and continues to treat patients.

Unfortunately, the church on IIe a Vache where Father Gilbert (Fr. John's replacement there) now serves and Fr. John helps support, received some more severe damage although it is still standing.

St. John's Global Mission Apostolate has worked with Fr. Henault for many years. We want to continue to support Fr. Henault and are asking for donations during this time of need. A second collection will be held **THIS** weekend. Additionally, anyone wishing to make a donation by cash or check (**made out to** *St. John's Mission Apostolate*) at another time can place it in an envelope marked for such and drop it in the regular collection basket or mail it to St. John's Parish. CROSS ROADS

Genesis 2: 18-24, Psalm 128: 1-6; Hebrews 2: 9-11; Mark 10: 2-16

The love that is our Triune God is permanent. The love of God for us, his children, is permanent. The love of God for his church is permanent. The love of God for his children and his Church is so profound and sacrificial that he made us in his own image and likeness, that he humbled himself to come into the world through Jesus Christ, to be one of us, to share in our lives, joys, and sorrows, to experience our vulnerability to the point of sharing the experience of our mortality. In rising from the dead, He overcame mortality so that we too could have eternal life. From creation God created man and woman, as suitable partners, and helpers for each other. That does not suggest subordination. Rather, according to commentators, it suggests a certain vulnerability to one another, and sensitivity to one another's needs, a unique and profound affinity between one man and one woman that is both supportive and nurturing.

In today's gospel, "God with Us," Jesus Christ, proclaims that God's intent from the beginning was that the conjugal relationship between a man and a woman would be permanent, as is the love of God Himself. The intent was that conjugal love reflect the permanent love that is the Trinity, the love of God for all creation, and for the Church. Thus, the role of conjugal love is to be a micro church, a symbol of the Church. The main task of the man and woman in marriage is to help each other to get to heaven, and to do the same for their children; and to do so with the simple trusting nature of a child. As children, for a time we all were completely dependent on our parents. As complementary helpers to each other, husband and wife always must acknowledge their total dependence on God while reflecting his pure love for each other, and toward others in need.

In today's world, the Church is under attack by Satan. A couple of the most blatant examples of this are Satan's attack on the family unit and its meaning, and Satan's attack on the unborn and partially born. The Church will never be overcome because Christ is the cornerstone. But Satan is the father of confusion and misdirection; and he can create havoc by chipping away at the family unit, which is part of the foundation of the Church. Let us maintain our marriages and families as our Creator intended.
