

#### Dedicated to the Holy Souls in Purgatory

In the Catholic Church, the month of November is traditionally given over to prayers for the holy souls. The most powerful form of prayer for the souls in purgatory is the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass.

### NEVER TOO LATE

**For God is all present:** for Him our prayers and the death of the person for whom we are praying coincide...Our intercession, therefore, can never arrive 'too late' since God by His very nature knows no before and after. **Our aid to the deceased person always arrives at the right moment, even if we are praying for them decades after their death.**—Fr. ### PURGATORY—A MYSTERY OF LOVE

**What is Purgatory?** All who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of Heaven. The church gives the name Purgatory to this final purification of the elect, which is entirely different from the punishment of the damned."—Catechism of the Catholic Church 1030, 1031

#### **What does the church teach about Purgatory?**

1. There is a Purgatory
2. The holy souls in Purgatory are in a state of grace and are assured of their eternal salvation.
3. They suffer to satisfy the justice of God for past sin which has been forgiven but has not been sufficiently atoned for. **Rev. 21:27; Mt. 5:8, 48**
4. The holy souls in Purgatory cannot help themselves, only the faithful on earth can help to shorten their time of purification by offering up works of penance, prayer, devotions, Eucharist adoration, gaining indulgences for them, but above all having the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass offered up for them. **2Mac. 12:43-46; CCC 958, 1471-1479**

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**CROSS ROADS**

**1 Kings 17: 10-16; Psalm 146: 7-10;**

**Hebrews 9: 24-28; Mark 12: 38-44**

In today's readings we have three examples of the generous, providential nature of God which we are called to imitate: the widow of Zarephath in the reading from Kings, the widow in Mark's gospel, and Christ in Paul's letter to the Hebrews. In each of those examples the giving was from their substance, from their poverty. In the case of the widow of Zarephath, she used all that was left of her flour and oil to feed Elijah, and what perhaps would be the last meal for her and her son. In the case of the widow in Mark's gospel, the widow gave only a few cents; but it was all she had. Finally, God became poor for us when he humbled himself through Jesus Christ to live among us and give every ounce of himself for our salvation. All of these are examples of sacrificial giving. In each case they gave all that they had, while demonstrating enormous faith and trust in God's providence. We too are called to give sacrificially (financial resources, time, energy).

This does not mean that we must impoverish ourselves, particularly when we have a family for whom we must provide. Saint Paul warned against this in 2 Corinthians 8:13: "...not that others should have relief while you are burdened," and "As it is written, whoever had much did not have more, and whoever had little did not have less." We strive for a fair equilibrium. We give from our substance not just from our excess. We give up something of our resources to help others. We respond to needy. As a priest friend of mine used to preach, "We are to live more simply so that others may simply live."

Finally, Jesus warns us to "Beware of the scribes" for whom it was all for appearances, for places of honor, for recognition from other people, for privilege, while at the same time treating people unfairly. The scribes and Pharisees of our time do things to burnish their so called "*legacy*" in the minds of other people. We are to be prophetic and counterculture. The only legacy we are to strive for is to live up to what God expects of each of us that we might make good use of the opportunity for salvation and help others to do the same. We each have our own set of circumstances. Ultimately, our sacrificial giving will not be measured by how much we gave, but by how much we have left. As the Lord humbled himself to be one of us, we too must humble ourselves to give and serve as a way of life, not to win the esteem of other people.
