

 O Holy Souls, I promise never to forget you!


St. John’s/St. Cecilia’s Collaborative

The Archdiocese of Boston, for the last 10 years or so, has been in the systematic process of addressing the shortage of priests through parish collaboratives. Many may know, some may not, that St. John’s is in a collaborative with St. Cecilia’s of Ashland. This is to go into effect, at the latest, in June of 2023. This means there will be one pastor for both parishes. Neither parish will close; each will retain its own identity. The financial arrangements will remain as they are, i.e., totally independent of each other. There may be a mutual sharing of parish staff. It is unclear if there will be more priests assigned to the collaborative other than the one pastor. It has not yet been determined who the pastor will be. The Mass schedules of both parishes will most likely be adjusted. There have been meetings already between some staff and representatives of each parish’s different ministries. The Bishop Rice Council of the Knights of Columbus, which is very active and quite successful, already embraces both St. John’s and St. Cecilia’s. Transitions can be challenging, so let us keep this upcoming parish shift in our prayers.

St. John's Bible Study



CROSS ROADS

Deuteronomy 30: 10-14;

Psalms 69: 14, 17, 30-31, 33-34, 36-37;

Colossians 1: 15-20; Luke 10: 25-37

The Lord's laws, statutes, and commandments are very close to us. They are based on sacrificial love, and they command us to refrain from harming each other, and more than that to help each other, especially those in need, because the Lord hears the cry of the poor, the afflicted, the sorrowful, those in bondage, those who are persecuted. Since the Lord is love, and the Lord is close to us, his laws are close to us, and they are implanted in us as part of our nature. But since the Fall, there are times that we do not turn to the Lord or heed his commands. The Lord's laws are simple (clear, understandable, straight forward). But simple does not mean they are easy. But if we follow them, we encounter a lot less of self-inflicted problems. They are a way of life and a prescription for attaining internal joy, and eternal life. The simplicity of all the Lord's commands is captured in the words recalled in today's gospel, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." The Scholar in today's gospel who asked what he must do to inherit eternal life was answered with a question, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" The scholar came up with the correct answer. But then the scholar asked, "And who is my neighbor?" In the parable of the good Samaritan, Jesus answered by including everyone as our neighbor, especially those who suffer and need help.

Simple, understandable, but sometimes difficult. Why? Because we are human. It can be uncomfortable to witness suffering, hunger, poverty, need, people begging on the streets. Each of us can think of reasons to shy away from such things. We need to pray for the empathy not only to feel the suffering of others, but also to act on it in some fashion. The more we pray about it, the more grace we receive to do something according to our individual gifts, and God's unique plan for each of us. When Jesus walked this earth, he spent most of his time tending to such people in need. Today, Jesus is telling us that if we want to inherit eternal life, "Go and do likewise."
