The Stations of the Cross

The Stations of the Cross, also known as the Way of the Cross or Via Crucis, commemorate Jesus' passion and death on the cross. There are 14 stations that each depict a moment on Our Lord's journey to Calvary, usually through sacred art, prayers, and reflections. The practice began as pious pilgrims traced His path through Jerusalem on the Via Dolorosa. This holy devotion was practiced as early as the days of the Emperor Constantine.

No one, however weak, is denied a share in the victory of the cross. No one is beyond the help of the prayer of Christ. His prayer brought benefit to the multitude that raged against him. How much more does it bring to those who turn to him in repentance.

St. John's has an AED (Automated External Defibrillator) on site! It is located in the **lower Sacristy** in the main church on the east wall in a white box. Should a cardiac event occur, the unit will walk you through the steps for use. Do you know where the closest exit is in the event of a fire? Did you know a fire pull box is located in the narthex north-side (left when leaving) and the lower Sacristy next to the AED? Additionally, we have multiple pull boxes and extinguishers in the Parish Center. Take a moment to look around.

CROSS ROADS

Jeremiah 31: 31-34; Psalm 51: 3-4, 12-15; Hebrews 5: 7-9; John 12: 20-23

In today's first reading Jeremiah proclaims that the LORD would make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah, because they broke the old covenant. But this time it would be different. The new covenant would not be written in stone. It would be written on the hearts of the people. It would be part of them. And the LORD would "forgive their evildoing and remember their sin no more." It would be a covenant rooted in love and forgiveness.

As we see in today's gospel, Christ is the fulfillment of that promise. It would be a covenant sealed by his sacrifice, his blood, the blood of the new and eternal covenant. Christ demonstrates two things, obedience to the will of the Father, and humility. He declares that unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies it just remains a grain of wheat. But if it dies, it produces much fruit. Christ declares that whoever loves his life loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. Christ came for this purpose and was determined to fulfill that purpose. Christ's prayer to his Father "Glorify your name" and the Father's response in a thunderous voice, "I have glorified it and will glorify it again" is a demonstration of Christ's reverence for the Father, and his obedience to the Father's will.

Saint Paul tells us that Christ "learned obedience from what he suffered." We are to emulate this by accepting our sufferings, joining them to the sufferings of Christ, and by dying to sin and the temporary allurements and temptations of this world. Then we truly can produce fruit. Like seeds scattered and then covered by the earth grow, pierce the ground, and seek the sun for energy, we can be empowered by the Lord to grow, pierce through the troubles of daily life, look up and seek the Lord, the Light of love, forgiveness, and eternal life; and do so with obedience and humility. One commentator (Eleanore Stump), summed up all of this in one sentence: "God honors those who seek to honor him." It will be Easter in three weeks. In the meantime, and through the rest of our lives, let us look up and seek the Lord, who is the Light of Truth and Eternal Life!
